## Good AI is good business\*

Just as firms commit to environmental sustainability, those pioneering AI solutions in education, healthcare, or finance, which are both sustainable and ethically sound, not only maintain customer loyalty and user trust but also cultivate enduring investments and attract top-tier talent. Moreover, robust AI frameworks help preempt legal and regulatory pitfalls.

Echoing the solid endorsement from industry leaders at the UNESCO Global AI Forum in Slovenia earlier this month, key stakeholders will deliberate on optimal AI governance strategies at the upcoming Certal/CCLATAM/DPL event in Madrid, en route to the Mobile World Congress in Barcelona.

## EI State of Affairs

Climate change came about by humanity's hands, now it's those same —albeit AI-powered— hands that will bring about the next stage of how we cohabitate this world of ours. It's summer in the region, the hottest January in recorded history, and combined with an ever fickler El Niño causing higher temperatures and longer droughts, it can only mean one thing for the Americas: wildfires.

In [Colombia](#), [Argentina](#) and some of the worst in [Chile's history](#), the region's fire response is being pummelled but it's fighting back, thanks to local initiatives like [Satellites on Fire](#). It's an AI-enhanced early warning system that uses satellite imagery in short, ten-minute intervals to detect flare ups in affected areas, allowing first responders to combat the spread of destruction faster, and helping institutions comprehend and anticipate such events.

This will eventually lead to the implementation of other AI-based tools, as well as affecting long term changes in the way policies regarding AI are developed, and regulated, by state agents in Latin America.

Tools such as the Chilean [Lemu](#) (meaning forest in Mapuche), that harnesses machine learning and AI to present users with a plethora of current projects to which they can donate to, in their words *"Don't worry, leave the project research to us."*; or [Kilimo](#), the Argentinean agtech that focuses on irrigation efficiency by way of data-based optimization crossed with meteorological data, that's already being used in Chile, Perú, México, Uruguay and the US, and has saved over 72bn litres of water since starting operations in 2014.

And implementation is the way in our corner of the global south, as a [2023 report](#) by Brazilian-based venture capital firm Latitud has shown, with over 63% of startups using AI in their operations in capacities “[ranging] from marginally to intensively, with low to high impact on their business.”, as the report puts it.

At the end of the day, regardless of how Latin America faces and seizes the opportunities that the ever-changing technological context present it with, you can always trust the region of doing just as Seu Jorge sang (covering David Bowie’s song Changes): “*Sempre em frente, nunca pra trás*”.

## Elsewhere en Latam

-  Costa Rica’s government has signed a deal with US-based cybersecurity firm [CrowdStrike](#). *“This agreement represents a significant step towards strengthening our capabilities in cybersecurity. Cooperation with CrowdStrike will allow us to jointly address current and future challenges in digital security, ensuring a safer and more resilient environment for our society and economy.”*, said Paula Bogantes, the nations Minister of Science, Innovation, Technology, and Telecommunications.
-  A joint initiative aimed at “*digital reindustrialization*” has been launched by [Innpulsa Colombia](#) and [Bancoldex](#), a local development bank. The push for digital transformation focuses on projects that improve the capabilities of micro, small and medium enterprises by way of cloud management. The credits offered range from COP\$100mn for micro scale enterprises, to COP\$300mn for medium ones.
-  In 2023, Mexico overtook Chinese exports for the [first time since 2002](#). Figures recently released by the U.S. Commerce Department show a 5% year-on-year increase from 2022 to 2023, totalling over USD\$475bn, meanwhile China dropped 20% to USD\$427bn. At the same time, Chinese investment in Latin America has [shifted away](#) from its typically massive emblematic projects, and started moving its focus in the region towards what they call “*new infrastructure*”, meaning innovative industries, ICTs, renewables and the like.
-  An [oil spill](#) off the coast of the twin-island nation of Trinidad and Tobago has officials scrambling to contain the mushrooming stain. Its origin is an upturned barge that was being tugged from Panama to Guyana. The 12km slick is now spreading towards the Caribbean, and Trinidad’s government has warned Venezuela and Grenada of possible damages to its territorial waters.

## La invitación

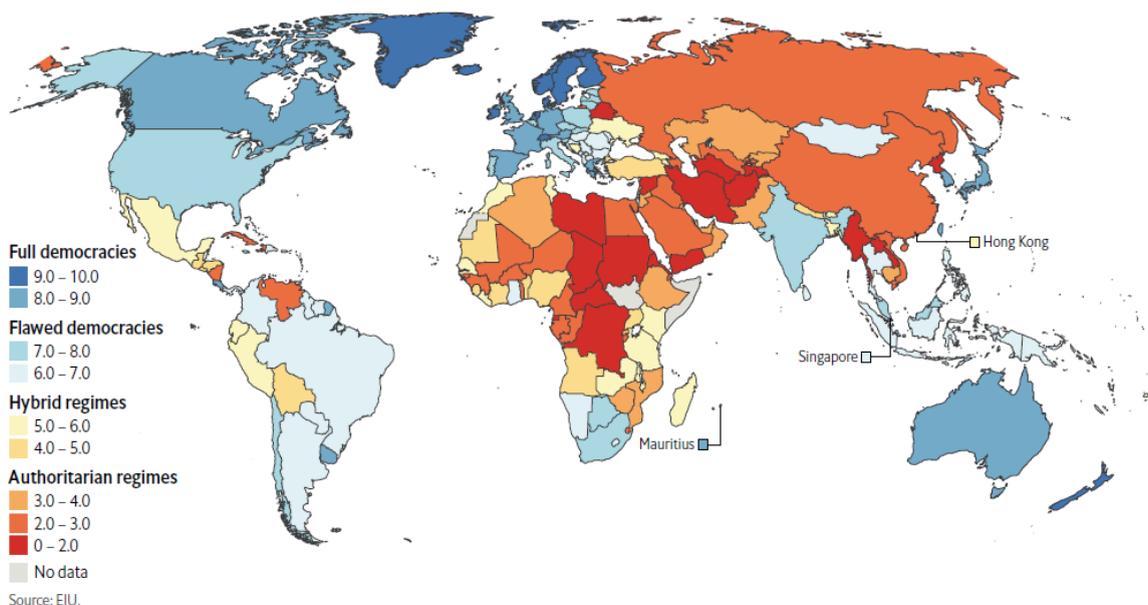
